Overcoming Homelessness Internationally Parish Outreach through 1,000 \$1.00 Donations

Close to 85 million people around the world have been made homeless by natural disaster and conflict. Our family of faith has an opportunity to help Shelter Box change this. Shelter Box is a100% volunteer organization, founded in 2002 by a




British Rotarian who wanted to bring dignity to people who have lost everything, home, job, and all their belongings. Rotary International provides 50% of the budget and 50% comes from private citizens. Shelter Box responds to 25 to 30 disasters a year, often to multiple disasters at once.

For \$1000.00 a green Shelter Box, that includes a durable tent that can house a family of ten for at least six months, water purification materials, portable shower materials, curtains to provide separate privacy areas among different generations within the family, mosquito nets or hats, scarves, gloves, is delivered directly to the distressed area that has been struck by a natural disaster (earthquake, tsunami, flood, volcano) or act of violence or war. The family keeps the tent forever. Shelter Box has no cost for labor, because volunteers do all the labor, including the packing, loading, shipping, delivering and setting up. All boxes are shipped and delivered to their destination usually within 48 hours.

Throughout the next year, JAM will periodically sponsor a collection of \$1.00 donations until our parish total reaches \$1,000.00. Initial contributions can be placed in the Poor Box near the church entrances the weekend of November 18-19. When sufficient funds are donated, St. John Parish will then send \$1000.00 to Shelter Box who will then issue a tracking number so we parishioners can track our box, where and when it is sent and delivered. SUNDAY CONNECTION

Gospel Reading Matthew 25:14-30

Jesus tells the parable of the talents, in which he teaches about the importance of using the gifts that God has given to us in service to the Kingdom of Heaven.

Family Connection

In today's Gospel, Jesus talks about the correlation between faithfulness and responsibilities. Family life provides many opportunities to illustrate this connection for children. As children prove themselves trustworthy, they can be trusted to take on greater responsibilities. Jesus teaches us in this parable that when we show ourselves to be trustworthy in small matters, we can be trusted to participate in greater matters of responsibility.

As you gather as a family, take some time to recall how each child in the family has matured and can now be trusted with greater responsibilities.

Say: In today's Gospel, Jesus talked about how our trustworthiness in small matters shows that we can also be trusted to share in the work of serving the Kingdom of Heaven. Read Matthew 15:14-30. Say: We share in the work of serving the Kingdom of Heaven when we use our talents to help and serve others.

As a family, choose one thing to do this week to serve others. Conclude in prayer together, asking God's help so that your family may serve others more faithfully.

Why Do Catholics Display the Crucifix?

When Catholics look at a crucifix, they see the God who became man and suffered, just as we do. The following are common human sufferings that Jesus endured and how his suffering can help us to bear our own.

Nothing quite says "Catholic" like a crucifix. They are attached to rosary beads, displayed in Catholic churches and homes and occasionally worn as jewelry. Catholics are often accused of "putting Jesus back on the cross," but nothing could be farther from the truth. When Catholics



look at a crucifix, they see the God who became man and suffered, just as we do. The following are common human sufferings that Jesus endured and how his suffering can help us to bear our own.

Trouble with Friends

During his agony in the garden of Gethsemane, Jesus' hand-picked friends fell asleep. All of them fled when he was arrested. His chosen leader of the Apostles, Peter, denied him three times; and only John, Mary Magdalene and his mother were courageous enough to keep him company at the foot of the cross.

When we have trouble with friends who are disloyal or distant, especially during trials, we can look at the crucifix and see that Jesus felt this same emotion. When we pray to him, we know that he understands exactly what we are enduring.

Physical Suffering

The human condition involves much physical suffering, some of it quite severe. Whether you suffer from cancer, arthritis, or other assorted aches and pains, temporary or long-term, you can always turn to Jesus for understanding.

Just looking at what a crucifix means and the number of wounds inflicted on our Savior can give one a perspective of what it is to suffer physically. Pray to Jesus for healing or to be able to bear your suffering. He knows how it feels.

Humiliation

Jesus was forced to endure multiple humiliations. He was scourged, mocked, spat upon and stripped naked. The very same people who had sung his praises on Palm Sunday a few days earlier, were now crying out for his death. Just look at the crucifix—our God was treated as a common criminal and executed in the most painful and humiliating manner possible.

Yet, he turned this into the greatest good, rising from the dead and saving us from our sins, granting us the gift of eternal life. When you feel humiliated and discouraged, turn to Jesus in prayer, knowing he has empathy for your suffering.

Abandonment by God

Even the most faithful Christians sometimes feel as if God has forgotten them. When it seems as if our prayers are not being heard, we can turn to the crucifix and remember the words Jesus cried, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" (Matthew 27:46)

This was not a cry of despair—Jesus knew that God was still present; but he was in fact quoting the opening of Psalm 22, which begins in agony and ends in a burst of glory. Read the entire Psalm and realize that God is always with you and hears your every prayer. Yet, like Jesus, you may have to suffer before the prayer is answered.

The Everyday Burdens of Life

Sometimes the demands of life can feel like heavy burdens, weighing us down and causing misery. The crucifix brings us hope. Like Jesus, we must bear our cross, but none is as heavy as his.

Although he warns that we must "pick up your cross and follow me," (Matthew 16:24), he also comforts us: "Take up my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am meek and humble of heart; and you will find rest for yourselves. For my yoke is easy, and my burden light." (Matthew 11:29-30)

Our God knows what if feels like to carry a heavy cross, both literally and metaphorically, but he will always be there to carry it with us.
